Have a great festive season and Safe travel wherever you go. We will see you all in February (No concert in January).



<u>Reg Lindsay's Country Homestead</u>

All four (4) words (above) ring a bell in my subconscious and the majority of us who are fifty (50) years or older will remember the Television show of the same name produced in Brisbane's Channel 9 Studios. Those who are younger will at least have heard of Homestead Country.

Reg Lindsay's success may have been modest compared to that of Keith Urban and Olivia Newton-John but as a trail-blazer, he prepared a path for all who now find success in our preferred music genre.



Yet, this icon of Country Music was ostracized by some within the local country music scene because they perceived him as being too American.

Born in Sydney and raised in rural New South Wales around Parkes and the Hunter River Valley, Reg Lindsay's roots were very much Australian.

The 'McKean Sisters', a successful duo were to ultimately connect Slim Dusty and Reg as Brothers' in Law with Slim marrying Joy and Heather becoming Reg's first wife. Reg tied the knot and married again in 1988 to Roslyn Winfield whom he met at the Cootamundra Rodeo.

Reg Lindsay, singer, songwriter, multi-instrumentalist, producer, entrepreneur and radio and television personality will be remembered for his contribution to the industry and those he helped on their road to success.

He won three (3) Golden Guitar Awards and wrote more than 500 songs. Reg is best known for his song "Armstrong", penned by John Stewart of 'The Kingston Trio', which reached No #8 on the charts in 1971. The vinyl single is now part of a time capsule at the US Space Center in Houston, Texas, to be opened in 2069.

In 1995, Reg was struck down by a cerebral aneurysm. This was followed, after a prolonged recovery, by a heart attack and a resultant triple bypass. A fourteen (14) year battle with health issues ended at age 79, 2008.

Coincidently, he died on 5 th August.	This also happened to be



<u>'TURN UP 2015'</u>

'<u>TURN UP 2015</u>', a symposium on the local music industry was held in October at the Nambour Civic Centre.

Peta-Maree and I attended the conference which consisted of six (6) packed hours of the foremost National and International

Artists and Guest Speakers, a Workshop on Guitar, and 'Lend Me Your Ears' which was some of the how's of song-writing.

The Song-writing session included amongst a distinguished panel, Peter Koppes ['The Church'] who contributed considerably to the discussions. Although is essential to have original material, it was emphasised that you need to find the 'right songs' to suit you, your line up and your particular style/ vibe so that you can emulate it on stage 'live'. Suggestions to build a tune off a drumbeat, lyric or riff and continually look for fertile territory for inspiration to create and express your ideas; were well received. And the obvious question was asked..... Which comes first??

As almost the oldest form of communication, song was passed down via the jesters of the court from castle to castle and its growth to what it is today can be traced directly back to such areas of melodic story-telling. It is and always will involve connecting with our individual environment. This is because it is the first language we encounter as an infant and the last one we lose in old age. We witnessed a number of fine acts in between guest speakers (e.g. Barry Bull, ex Toombul Music) and the various sessions.

One of Australia's finest guitarists Owen Van Larkins shared the stage with Phil Emmanuel where they duelled on a piece that I believe one of them had never heard or seen before. Needless to say, we were all mesmerized on a later solo when Owen's hands moved up, down, across and around the fret board, sometimes in a blur; and one would have thought their ears were playing tricks on them when sounds similar to that of a grand piano, concert pianist began to flow. I got my money's worth from that session alone!!

Dennis Dunstan ex Manager of Fleetwood Mac provided an insight into Music Management and his experiences and the current state of the Music Industry.

Country appears to be leading the way!! Why? ... because it has adapted/evolved encompassing complementary parts of other genres be they Rock or Jazz, etc. to be more relevant in its modern format.



Nashville is now the centre of the Music Industry in U.S.A.

Vegas and New York can no longer claim the title.

Big things are starting to happen once again!..... although he was up-front in stating that, for the past 25 years, Australia had not had an international headline band.
