



BASS in the place!! The importance of bass in a piece of music is often underestimated ... here's an overview of how it happens!

The music

Technically, bass notes span the low frequency range from 16.35 Hz (C0) to 261.6 Hz (C4). The lowest of these tones present a challenge to modern amplified sound technology, and would typically be produced by a pipe organ, which produces very pure tonic sounds. The characteristic sounds produced by bass stringed instruments are defined by a range of higher 'overtones'. The lowest note on a double bass, or on it's counterpart the four-string electric bass guitar is 41.20 Hz (E1). This is not as low as the lowest note on a piano, which is 27.50 Hz (A0)

The idea of a musical 'bass line' first came into prominence during the baroque period of music, from 1600 to 1750. These composers wrote scores for the harpsichord, and for the pipe organ, where the bass notes were played with foot pedals. This practice evolved into the concept of bass being the root of multi-part harmonies for choirs and orchestras.

In modern music, the bass line is most often carried by the electric bass guitar, in conjunction with the bass drum ... the upright bass (double bass) may feature in jazz, folk or rockabilly combos.

Listeners may easily understand how the bassist works with the drummer to provide a **rhythmic foundation** ... a good-feeling, steady pulse that drives the music along. Less apparent is the bassist's **harmonic function** ... the way the bass melds with other instruments to emphasize the melodic 'feel' of the composition.

Much of the time, the bass will start on the 'root' note of the chord, which assists to define the chord in the overall sound of the combo. Although it is possible to play chords on the bass, the result often sounds 'muddy', and it is more usual to play other notes of the chord as single notes ... as arpeggios, or 'bass riffs'. The composition and performance of these bass riffs and runs are what defines the style of a bass player.

Traditionally, certain basslines or bass riffs are associated with certain musical genres. In bluegrass and traditional country music, basslines often emphasize the root and fifth of each chord, and are played on beats 1 & 3, as a mimic and emphasis of the 'pick-strum' guitar style. In swing, jazz, and jump blues, basslines are often created from a continuous sequence of quarter notes called a "walking bass line". These styles have descended directly from the classical baroque music, and elements of walking bass are appropriate to most other musical styles.

In rock and metal, and especially in latin, salsa music, jazz fusion, and reggae, basslines may be very rhythmically complex and syncopated.

The instruments

In classical orchestral music, the bassline is carried by a number of instruments

- Brass ... Tuba, Bass Trombone, Bass Saxophone
- Woodwinds ... Bassoon, Contrabassoon
- Strings ... Double Bass, Cello

Some of these instruments played from 'transposition scores', written for clarity an octave higher than normal. Some combinations are played an octave apart.

For marching bands the tuba was too unwieldy to be carried, and in 1893 band leader and composer John Phillip Sousa commissioned J.W. Pepper to design the Sousaphone, which is bent in a circle to fit around the musician's body. I wonder if **he** was the inspiration for 'Sgt Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band'?

The advent of 'popular music' combos saw the almost universal use of the double

bass, plucked (pizzicato) rather than bowed. But this is a cumbersome unit, and the need for a more portable instrument, plus the need to create greater volumes from small combos, was addressed by the invention of the prototype electric bass guitar in 1950.

The following year, Leo Fender marketed his 'Precision Bass' guitar, an instrument that revolutionised the sound of popular music. Its name derived from the use of a fretted fingerboard as opposed to the fretless fingerboard of the double bass, thus giving a more exact intonation for each note.

This in itself is a paradox ... the concept was preceded centuries earlier by the bass viol, a baroque stringed instrument with frets made from gut tied around the instrument's neck, and played upright, like a cello, with a bow. Conversely, a number of 'fretless' electric basses have been developed for those bassists who seek the traditional sound.

Since the 50s, and in direct conjunction with the development of the 'music industry' as we know it today, the electric bass has become the de-facto standard for carrying the bassline in popular music.



And although they lack the pizzazz of prominent lead guitarists, good bassists are an essential component of any musical combo.
