Ahhhh it's Christmas time again and I have put up decorations in my home and workplace and already enjoyed the company of some friends and family around nice meals and refreshments.

Prioritising is always at the fore of successful outcomes and I must admit that my music has taken a bit of a back seat for me this year. Having missed three concerts due to the cold and flu season I felt somewhat disconnected so hope that the coming year will be a healthier, more productive one.

In this editorial I would like to focus on the importance of practice. As we all know the more we do something the better we get at it. At Homestead we practice each Tuesday night in preparation for the monthly concerts but over and above that the band members practice in their own time and it is just as important for the other performers to practice their vocal and instrumental skills so that we can all give our best possible performance on the night.

So how is it best to practice your songs? If you can manage to sing every day that will go a long way to strengthening your vocal chords but its important not to force your voice too much before you warm up. Try starting slow with a song that's not too challenging or do some vocal scales or warm up exercises. If you're not sure how to do this ask around as many of our Homestead members are familiar with these techniques. Once you're warmed up you will be ready to try more challenging songs without risking your vocal chords.

Secondly, try to spend as much time as possible learning the lyrics of your song. It is always lovely to see singers looking up at the audience and it is easier to put more

emotion and gestures in when you are familiar with the words. Thirdly, think about what the song is saying and how best you can relate that to the audience. Put yourself in the picture so to speak and sing as though the song is really about your own experiences, even if it isn't. Finally and most importantly, enjoy yourself! It's not an exam, just do your best and if things don't go quite to plan you can always take the learnings and take actions to improve any deficiencies next time.

The October concert was somewhat experimental for our members and audience as a different PA was used courtesy of Liam Kennedy-Clark. He had only taken possession of the full system a few days before and it was agreed to use the concert to run-in the system under performance conditions. It was an auspicious beginning albeit with a few teething glitches.

The system is capable of sufficient volume to lift the roof, but was run at idling capacity for our concert with a clarity both on and off stage markedly better than the Homestead system. We are looking at a possible upgrade of our system during the Christmas – New Year break.

Our performers did extremely well and lifted their performances to match the better sound with some appropriate Halloween spooky numbers and costumes. The audience were also heavily involved with the ghostly scene. The song "I Put a Spell On You" from the film Hocus Pocus was a great hit for the night.

November was back to our normal concert arrangements and went off brilliantly. There was a lively performance of an ABBA set with dress-ups and dance moves by Jenny and Carmel. 





























# Feature Article

In many ways the most successful and familiar character actor of American sound films and the only actor to date to win three Oscars for Best Supporting Actor, Walter Brennan attended college in Cambridge, Massachusetts, studying engineering. While in school he became interested in acting and performed in school plays.

He worked some in vaudeville and also in various jobs such as clerking in a bank and as a lumberjack. He toured in small musical comedy companies before entering the military in 1917.

After his war service he went to Guatemala and raised pineapples, then migrated to Los Angeles, where he speculated in real estate. A few jobs as a film extra came his way beginning in 1923, then some work as a stuntman.

He eventually achieved speaking roles, going from bit parts to substantial supporting parts in scores of features and short subjects between 1927 and 1938. In 1936 his role in Come and Get It (1936) won him the very first Best Supporting Actor Academy award. He would win it twice more in the decade, and be nominated for a fourth. Hi range was enormous. He could play sophisticated businessmen, con artists, local yokels, cowhands and military officers with apparent equal ease.

An accident in 1932 cost him most of his teeth, and he most often was seen in eccentric rural parts, often playing characters much older than his actual age. His career never really declined, and in the 1950's he became an even more endearing and familiar figure in several television series, most famously The Real McCoys (1957). He died in 1974 of emphysema, a beloved figure in movies and TV, the target of countless comic impressionists, and one of the best and most prolific actors of his time.

# The Humble Evolution of Halloween and its Influence on Today's Music

One of my favourite pastimes, (apart from my lifetime obsession with music), is History and since retirement, I have visited many places that remain etched in my brain from school days. When this also involves music, I am usually more interested and absorbed. Our holiday to Britain and recent Halloween-themed concert are testimonial to both history and music, and together, strongly influence what happens at a specific time each year. Halloween and its history are spell-bounding as it was, in many ways, where the foundations of Celtic; ...Irish, Scottish and Skiffle music can be traced. This also includes similar dance music roots where Irish, Scottish and Morris Dancing and their flamboyant and colourful costuming first emanated.

British farmers in the 15<sup>th</sup>, 16<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> centuries lived in small villages where the cultivation of crops and final harvest had to be completed by August/September before the onset of winter when the ground would soon be covered with snow and ice, frozen solid and unworkable. There were no bitumen roads, automobiles or electricity. Candle wax, was also considered too expensive, for many of these peasant households to purchase.

So, after nightfall, the pitch black of darkness was unavoidable and oncoming winter meant families hibernated in their thatch dwellings to sit the winter out. During the long, cold winter; village elders organised house to house sharing of supplies. Hence the beginning of what is now celebrated as *'Trick or Treat'*.

With no electricity, large bonfires in the village heralded end of harvest festivities late in October each year. Superstition was prevalent amongst the populous and bonfires were also seen as tools to chase away the evil spirits on the oncoming winter. Music, dancing and singing were all part of village life and togetherness at this time of the year. Many of these villagers were to emigrate to the New World, America and what happened with the continued evolvement of Halloween devoid of government jurisdictions, is now modern history. Unfortunately, much of what happens today is tied to commercial interests and what monies/profits can be made. To my mind, it has spoilt what was a very healthy community activity to one of crazy commercialism.

Nevertheless, it should be remembered that Halloween and its roots can be traced to Celtic Britain and its history is both curious and fascinating analysis.
