



March was the first of our theme concert nights this year. Irish and St Paddy's Day were entwined with some Classic Country. Liam's 'Moon Over Ireland' was a perfect choice for the night whilst Boppa's 'The Unicorn' set the tone for the evening's festivities

with Noah chasing the Unicorn through the audience during his



performance. The duet by our Joeys, Ayla and April 'Thank God I'm a Country Girl' caught everyone by surprise as they swayed the audience and received massive applause. Hi Folks:

I was born in Brisbane in 1946, to an Aussie girl, and an American Serviceman. Mum was a war bride, so we went to live in Boston Massachusetts, until 1953, when my parents divorced. Mum, baby-sister and I returned to Brisbane, where I spent the next nine years at school. My father was a drummer, and luckily it was in me also, so I planned to make it my profession. In the mid 1960's, I spent two years in Melbourne and played in several interesting bands,

before returning to Brisbane and 'The Playboy Club'.

Working as a 'Contract' session player, was always interesting. Luckily numerous bands I was part of, had recorded, so I had the experience. I also did a lot of lead vocal work. Singing drummers were rare before the 1990's, so it helped with my employment prospects. I owe a debt of gratitude to my teacher-mentor and friend, Harry Lebler, who left us many years ago, but is widely remembered as a percussion innovator, here in Brisbane. He was one of a kind...

In 1970 I spent six months in Vietnam, playing shows for the troops, and remained in Asia for three years. We worked numerous countries including Thailand, Philippines, Japan etc; also beautiful Guam. Back to Brisbane's Nightclubs in 1973, to do the grueling 9PM – 3AM six nights a week circuit. Nightclubs then were all 'Live Music', floor shows, show girls, curtains, spotlight, fine dining – and not a D.J. in sight! The band 'sight-read' and could back artists.

In 1976 I returned to the United States for a reunion with my father. I stayed twelve months, and while there, also toured with the 'White Brothers Band'.

In 1977 I was home and back on the band circuit again. I also taught part time at 'Northside Academy' and at home. In the 1980's I was part of a children's show at Channel 7 Brisbane, acting and playing music. It lasted three years – Great Fun! In 2000 I came to 'Homestead' and have stayed. I consider myself very lucky to have always played with great people.

Lastly, my wife, Cheryl for her patience, love and support throughout the decades. Thank you.

1950's Country Music - a defining decade.



The 1950's saw Country Music developing a harder beat due to the increased use of electronic instruments. At the time, Jazz and Classical music were trying in some ways to re-invent themselves and Country Music was 'top of the heap' and the most sought-after music style around. That decade, 1950-1960, proved to be a peak for Country Music and the events, timing and the people who were

instrumental in creating such a highpoint were destined to do so. They included, among many, many others:

Early in his career, Elvis Presley was asked by Sam Phillips (Sun Records)... "What can you do?" His reply was... "I can do anything". And it was so very true, whether it be Pop standards, Gospel, Jazz, R&B, or Country Music ... and later on, (as it developed and evolved), Rock 'n Roll. In 1955, Elvis had two (2) of his records make the national charts and this was the catalyst to his signing a National Country contract headlined by country legend Hank Snow. Elvis was still, very much Country during that decade, although Hank did introduce him as a 'Folk Fireball'.

Internationally; 1957 saw the opening of The Tavern Club in Liverpool England, featuring Skiffle bands and Jazz. The Beatles were to perform and be discovered here in years to come. In Australia, 1952, The Smoky Dawson radio show commenced. 1957, Slim Dusty records *Pub With No Beer* and 1959, Geoff Mack releases *I've Been Everywhere*.

Country was the model and forerunner for so many different genres and artists. Western Swing, Honky Tonk and Rockabilly were all classified as Country sub-genres within the 50s. [Rock 'n Roll was in its infancy but gaining momentum!] Rock Around The Clock by Bill Haley & the Comets was released (1955) as Rockabilly. So too was Maybelline, (also 1955), which was a rewritten 1938 country song 'Ida Red'. The former is now considered the beginning of Rock 'n Roll and Maybelline, according to Rolling Stone Magazine, ... "Rock 'n Roll guitar starts here."

In 1957 Sam Cooke released *You Send Me*, the best-selling song of the year. In time, it is to be re-classified as the beginning of "Soul".1957 saw Ricky Nelson record his first single, *Teenager's Romance*. The release was televised as part of "The Adventures of Ozzie & Harriet" TV show. Initial orders were 60,000 culminating in over one million sales. He is to be later re-classified in the 70's as one of LA's pioneer Country Rockers. It poses the questions… How would they classify 21st Century songs by Keith Urban and Lee Kernaghan had they been written half a century ago? ... and.. Will they be re-classified in years to come?

Country Music has endured breakaways and divisions, adjusted to foibles, fashions and follies that have, in some ways, been a distraction from its path and progress. Despite such artists as Alabama, George Jones, Waylon Jennings & The Eagles, the 60's and 70's were overshadowed by Folk & its anti-establishment causes* and the upsurge and worldwide explosion of Rock 'n Roll. It would wait till the 80's & 90's before Country regained much of its ascendency of the 1950's with a plethora of new stars including Randy Travis, Le Ann Rimes, Keith Urban & Glen Campbell.

The dawning of a new century a mere 18 years' ago has seen Country Music hold its own against fierce competition from all other forms of music. And thanks in part to its 50's legacy, the future remains bright for many years to come!

*Bob Dylan, Pete Seeger, Peter, Paul & Mary and Joan Baez were major 60's Folk & Folk Fusion artists, the latter refusing to pay 60% of her tax as a protest against US military spending.
