'My Say' Segment



The second wave of the Coronavirus has now surfaced and border closures as well as ever altering restrictions make it difficult to predict tomorrow's outcome. Every day we seem to find the situation changing with cluster outbreaks, premises contamination and personal contact virus infections. Beware the vulnerable over 60's !!

For those unaware, when diagnosed with Covid-19, patients requiring a ventilator have to endure painful throat intubation under anaesthesia for 2 to 3 weeks without moving, often upside down, with a tube inserted from the mouth up to the trachea to allow you to breathe. The patient can't talk or eat, - the machine keeps you alive.

The discomfort and pain requires sedatives and painkillers. It's like being in an artificial coma. After 20 days from this treatment, a young patient loses 40% muscle mass, and gets mouth or vocal cords' trauma, as well as possible pulmonary or heart complications. It is for this reason that old or already weak people can't withstand the treatment and almost all die. For those who think this is an exaggeration, do your own checks. Recovery, post ventilator can include hallucinations, depression and impact the heart, liver, kidneys, gut and brain. It is scary!! Please stay safe and well!

However despite all this doom & gloom, some sense of normality is beginning to emerge as we can now, once again mingle and begin to hone our relative musical and vocal talents via weekly rehearsals at Stanmore Hall, Caboolture. But as I indicated in an earlier edition, the new 'norm' is an ever changing environment and we will need to patiently navigate and embrace these changes as they are implemented to protect the general populace and society from the possibility of the evolving health issues relative to this horrible Covid-19 pandemic.

Social Distancing and maintaining strict protocols to avoid the possible transfer of dangerous bacteria via hands and microphone sanitation will become commonplace. Such changes are good policy anyway especially when most of us fall into the vulnerable category age group.

As the likelihood of a concert remains a fair way down the horizon, the regular four (4) week cycle of practice has indeed been extended and the opportunity to try some new and possibly more challenging songs is now available to those who wish to test themselves.

But when one is severely hearing impaired as in my particular situation, it is just wonderful to be able to find a correct starting note and sing in tune.

SLIM DUSTY (1927-2003)

'Tis 17 years, this month (Sept. 2020) since the passing of Slim Dusty yet his title of 'Australia's King of Country' remains unchallenged.



Born at Nulla Nulla Creek near Kempsey, his early roots in hillbilly and folk music, together-with success and longevity, made him the face of Australian Country Music for almost seven (7) decades.

The number '7' must have been a lucky number for Slim as he sold more than seven (7) million records and earned 70 gold and platinum album certifications. He was a pioneer in so many ways. How many people (worldwide) would have had the intestinal fortitude to change their name at the age of 11? Born David Gordon Kirkpatrick, and picking up a guitar aged seven (7), Slim Dusty powered into history and never looked back!

He documented Australia's unique spirit and history through song as well as contributing to our culture and society.

In 1951 he married Joy McKean and in 1954, together, they launched the Slim Dusty Travelling Show.

Despite the emergence of Rock & Roll and loss of airplay in metropolitan Australia, Slim never lost his country and regional Australia popularity. Ten years on, in 1964, the Slim Dusty Australia-round Tour commenced, a 48,280 km, 10 months journey that continued annually until 2001.

He wrote his first song "The Way the Cowboy Dies" in 1937 and "When the Rain Tumbles Down in July" was his first record in 1945. Joy became much more than his wife, with Manager and Songwriter added to her resume. She is credited with penning several of Slim Dusty's most popular songs, including "Lights On The Hill", "Walk a Country Mile", "The Indian Pacific", "Kelly's Offsider" and "The Biggest Disappointment".

Bush ballads and truckin' songs were and still are pure gold to Country Music. In 1957, Slim Dusty was the first Australian to have a No. 1 international hit song, with a version of Gordon Parsons "A Pub with No Beer". It was the biggest-selling record by an Australian to that time, the first Australian single to go gold and the first and only 78 rpm record to be awarded a gold disc. But the records don't end there! Slim Dusty is the only artist to have recorded on every major commercial music format – from 78rpm records through vinyl LPs, singles, cassettes, 8-track and CDs, to VHS video and DVD, and now iTunes and ring tones.

Slim Dusty's remarkable life and even more extraordinary career was to see the release of even more legendry songs including "Duncan", "G'Day, G'Day", "Looking Forward, Looking Back", "Charleville", "Cunnamulla Fella" and so many more.

Not a bad legacy for a career lasting almost seven (7) decades!!

Jan was born and raised in Ipswich and considers herself to have been quite a tomboy in her youth. She always says she was the son her dad never had. She loves animals and should



have been a Vet but didn't have the scholastic qualifications. Her high school years finished at grade 9. She then began work as an aide at an aged men's home before she changed occupation to be a seamstress. This was her occupation up to and after her marriage to Norm and the birth of her two children.

As to her sewing abilities, for those of you who have seen the **vast** black curtains at the backstage of the Boondall Entertainment Centre, you should know they would not still be there except for Jan's expert repairs after a stage-hand for a large touring band drove a forklift through them! She also sewed and fitted the stage curtains at the back of the performing stage at Kedron-Wavell Services Club.

Once her children left home, she and Norm moved to Kilcoy from their home of 35 years at Albany Creek in Brisbane. Jan expressed an interest in singing at Homestead after she and Norm became members. Some rehearsal at home and she started singing. She found her voice and preference in swing and other music from the early 30s, 40s, and 50s. Her songs are received very well by the audiences at Homestead and at Jallas Cafe sessions and Playitt music at Woodford. She and Norm also perform for retiree villages, nursing homes and respite centres. Jan has never had formal training but her husband Norm says she has an extremely sweet tone and sings in the soprano range. (i.e. way above his growl.) They occasionally sing duets and she always shows him up.
