The year is all but over, bar our involvement in Christmas singsong and festivities. Nevertheless it has shown to be a re-birth of musical involvement post Covid 19 in that musicians have been able to perform without the strict restrictions that had the industry 'on hold' for so long.

However it is noteworthy that many musicians, (and especially established musicians,) used this 'time- On Hold' to assess and improve their on-stage personas and investigate maintaining and enhancing their 'audience connection'.

To this end, I was interested to discover that such analysis has allowed musicians of all genres and benchmarks to empathise and connect with their audience in a more focused and two-way relationship. Such research included the following:

Singing songs listeners want to hear. [*Investigate the demographics*] Selecting songs within one's vocal range and one's ability/proficiency.

The importance of Visuals including Dress, Gestures and Eye contact. [Never ignore your audience! To spark interest, you have to attract the eye.]

Entertaining encompasses and is linked to audience values which include trust and honour. Therefore, knowing who your audience is and conveying recognition and respect. To achieve this, you must be sincere, natural and intent on pleasing. Take every opportunity to interact with the audience and note their reaction. Use this... 'reaction to engagement' to your advantage.

Don't try to please everyone! Attempt the majority and certainly not a minority.

Enlarged, happy audiences are beneficial to our, on stage, livelihood.

FEATURE ARTICLE JUDITH DURHAM

Judith Durham, AO, was the lead vocalist in The Seekers, Australia's Folk Music supergroup. She graduated from the University of Melbourne (Conservatorium) Associate in Music (AMusA), her intended career, Pianist. However, her extraordinary talent and love for singing generated her destiny.



With back up musically and vocally from Bruce Woodley, Keith Potger and Athol Guy, The Seekers recorded so many top 10 hits, their first being "I'll Never Find Another You" which reached No#1 in the UK and Australia.

In 1967, The Seekers, set an official all-time record of 200,000 (nearly 10% of the population of Melbourne), as they flocked to their performance at the Sidney Myer, Melbourne Music Bowl. The following year, 1968, during a tour of New Zealand, she made the decision to leave The Seekers and pursue a Solo career. In 1969, Judith married her musical director, British jazz pianist Ron Edgeworth. They lived in UK and Switzerland until the mid-1980's when they moved to a property in Yandina Qld.

In 1990, after recovery from a car accident, Judith was enticed to reconnect with The Seekers for a Silver Jubilee performance. During this reunion, Ron Edgeworth was diagnosed with Motor Neurone disease, (ALS) and died in 1994. Judith dedicated many proceeds and became the national patron to the Motor Neurone Disease Association of Australia.

Although she continued, primarily as a solo performer, she made sporadic recordings with The Seekers. In 2015, she was named Victorian of the Year for her services to music and a range of charities.

In 2013, she suffered a stroke and had to relearn how to read and write, both literature and music; however, her vocal prowess was unaffected.

Judith Durham was born with asthma and at the age of four was diagnosed with Measles, the severity of which left her with a life-long chronic lung disease Bronchiectasis which eventually took her life this year, 2022.

CONCERT SPOTLIGHTS















Reindeer & Rudolf



I have always found 'History' something that constantly aroused my sense of amazement. It continues to this day and as a result, I often ponder 'what if' when I learn something new, re yester-year happenings of time gone by.

Santa Claus is one character whose history is equally remarkable and worthy to explore. Initial references to this character are based on St Nicholas of Myra and Sinterklaas of Dutch lore. Both of these figures travelled on horseback via a noble white steed. However, a habitat in the North Pole and abundant herds of reindeer resulted in a not so unnatural transition which became the more accepted within western culture. A reindeer-drawn rather than horse-drawn sleigh was followed up with verse written by Clement Clarke Moore* in 1823, where Santa's eight (8) reindeer were named.......

Dasher, Dancer, Prancer & Vixen Comet, Cupid, Dunder & Blixem

'Dunder and Blixem' literally translated to 'thunder and lightning' and was a popular Dutch-American expletive in the late 18th century.

This was swiftly altered to 'Donder' which is the more acceptable spelling of the colloquialism 'Dunder' meaning thunder and 'Blitzen', which is said to better rhyme with 'Vixen' and is a German word meaning 'flash', 'sparkle' & 'lightning'.

The later change to 'Donner' was instituted by publishers, instead of one word Dutch and one German.

However, there was No Rudolf !!!

116 years were to pass before 'Rudolf the Red Nosed Reindeer' was created under the pen of copywriter Robert May, in 1939, as he peered at the thick fog that drifted off Lake Michigan and enveloped Chicago.

Based on the theme of 'The Ugly Duckling', he envisaged a reindeer with a luminous nose guiding Santa and his sleigh through the dense and murky atmospheric conditions.

However, history would have seen his efforts destined for the company's archived files or a dingy library shelf; had it not have been for his Brother-in Law, Johnny Marks, penning and setting the story to music.

Bing Crosby reportedly turned down the opportunity to record the song. Hence, Gene Autry, the singing cowboy, recorded it; sold two million copies in the first year, 1949, and the rest is history.

How many million times is it sung, every Christmas, around the world?...!!!!

MEMBER BIOGRAPHY: PAM MATTHEWS

I was born in Ayr North Qld the youngest of three. My father was a cane cutter, timber cutter and moved around quite a bit where ever the work took him. He later bought a truck and built it into a shop on wheels and took it around the cattle stations and outback towns in Queensland the Northern territory and the top of



Western Australia so the kids had to go into boarding school in Charters Towers. At that time I was just six years old.

We moved to Darwin when I was nine. Dad bought another truck and he worked for the mines in Rum Jungle and U.D.P. mines in Adelaide River carting uranium from the mines to the wharf. We still had a lot of stock left so Mum my brother, sister and I did the outback on our own. To relieve the boredom of the journey over long, dusty potholed tracks we sang all the way to various destinations where our arrival was much anticipated and welcome. We met some of the real characters of outback Australia and gained an appreciation of aspects of an Australian way of life that other people living in the big towns and cities would never know.

I had to leave school at twelve and go to work. I worked in a coffee shop and used the first coffee machine to make it into Darwin. I was only just tall enough to pull the handle down. These days they have buttons, levers, switches and flashing lights. How the times have changed.

As a teenager Darwin was the best place to grow up, although there wasn't much in the way of entertainment. However, every once in a while the traveling shows would come through including Rick and Thel, Stan Coster, Slim Dusty and many others. My favorite was the Buddy Williams show they had nice young fellows with the band and my friends went wild. The isolation of Darwin brought people together in very tight social groups and some of the friendships that were forged in those days still endure after the passage of many decades.

I was married in 1962 and had two beautiful children who still live in Darwin. We went through cyclone Tracey in 1974, and then spent 12months in Rockhampton before going back to Darwin where our marriage broke up. I worked at the University for 14 years and in that time I bought my own home, joined a country music club where I met this charming man who you all know as Frank. We have now been together for 36 years. We moved

down here in 97 and joined Homestead almost straight away. I didn't sing for a long time but was talked into it by (so called) Friends. We used to entertain at Nursing Homes and Senior Citizens Clubs and I loved doing this immensely. It brought a lot of satisfaction to see the oldies singing along to the songs they remembered.

I have made so many friends here at Homestead it is a second home for me. This is just a shortened summary of my life. If I put it all in, it would rival War and Peace.
