FEATURE ARTICLE - Alan Jackson





Alan Jackson, all American singer, songwriter, has received more awards, nominations and accolades than the majority of his contemporaries. These include:-

35 No#1 hits; 50 Top 10 hits; 31 Albums; 2 Grammys;

17 CMA [Country Music Association] Awards;

16 ACM [Academy of Country Music] Awards;

50+ ASCAP [American Society of Composers, Authors & Publishers] Awards.

His distinctive voice, heartfelt lyrics and a traditional country sound has left an indelible mark on the genre and he has become one of the most respected figures in country music history. His debut album "Here in the Real World" (1990), showcased his unique blend of traditional honky-tonk and contemporary country elements and hit singles like "Wanted" and "Chasin' That Neon Rainbow" established him as a rising star. Throughout his career, Jackson's music has been characterised by its relevant themes, emotional intensity and genuine storytelling. Chart-topping albums "Don't Rock the Jukebox" (1991); "A Lot About Livin' (And a Little 'bout Love)" (1992); and "Drive" (2002); produced a string of hits like "Chattahoochee", "Gone Country" and "Remember When".

His commitment to preserving the traditional country sound has earned him esteem as well as controversy. In 2000, he collaborated with George Strait with "Murder on Music Row" in a rallying call for Country to return to its traditional bluegrass roots. Certainly, some country had been gravitating towards pop music and some artists such as Kenny Chesney, Faith Hill and Shania Twain considered more culpable than most. However one radio station stated; "We are not playing it and we never will. It puts down today's modern country music, and that's against everything we're about." [KIK-FM (94.3)]. But at L.A.-based KZLA-FM (93.9), which is playing the song, Operations Manager R.J. Curtis said, "This is an event record, with two of the icons of our format recording together. . . . To me it's pretty simple, but maybe I'm an idiot. Whether it becomes an anthem for the statement in the song, I don't know."

Despite the lyrics "Ol' Hank wouldn't have a chance on today's radio" and "For the steel guitars no longer cry/ And you can't hear fiddles play/ With drums and rock 'n' roll guitars/ Mixed right up in your face," the song and the unforgettable duet later went on to win a CMA Award in 2000 for Vocal Event Of The Year, as well as 2001 Song Of The Year.

Beyond the music, Jackson is known for his humility and authenticity and he remains grounded in his Georgia roots and often pays tribute to his family and upbringing in his songs.

MEMBER BIOGRAPHY: STEVEN FRASER

My mother purchased my first guitar when I was 9 years old. It was a Hofner semi acoustic, similar to the one played by Easybeats' rhythm guitarist George Young, a Club 60 Hofner; [cost £79 / 15's in 1960... valued around \$5000 today]. I learned instrumental songs mainly from the Shadows and the Atlantics. In high school I teamed up with some senior students and formed a band. Some of my friends at the time



were Robbie Rosenlund, his brother Jimmy, and bass player Laurie Stone. Robbie joined Wickety Wak, Laurie joined Railroad Gin, and I joined the RAAF.

Whilst in the Air Force I played at various places around Melbourne and Sydney, teaming up with like-minded musos. The problem, whilst in the Air Force, was that just as you got really good at your music, the band members got transferred away and so you have to start again. I also did some solo gigs in restaurants and nightclubs for a while. Similarly, post Cyclone Tracy [1974/75], I was transferred to Darwin.

I met Heather whilst in the Air Force. We were married in 1976 at Penrith NSW. After leaving the Air Force, I played at several restaurants in Sydney, including a nice little trio at the Businessman's Club in Parramatta for quite a while.

I joined Overseas Telecommunications Commission (OTC) and became a Maritime Radio Officer, working at Sydney Radio (VIS) and was transferred to Thursday Island Radio (VII) in 1981 where our family, Heather, our son Matthew, and daughter Melissa lived for 5 years until 1986. During our time on TI, we had many enjoyable moments from boating, singing and playing guitar in the pubs, and having a new baby, Rebecca. We made some great friends whilst on the Island and still keep in contact with many of them. In 1986 I was transferred to Brisbane.

Bruce Berry, a work colleague, informed me of a Country Music Club that operated from the Caboolture Historical Village. So, one Tuesday night I popped into Homestead to see what it was all about. That was around 1998 or 1999. I've been here ever since, playing and singing, and sharing some great music. I have shared the stage with many talented musicians and loved the comradery which is part of the Homestead culture. I have also tried to help artists perform to the best of their ability and to improve their performances.


